PLC CHAIRMAN MATIONAL PAST PRESIDENT ROUND TABLE GB&I



As part of The Big Weekend in Nottingham, 41 Club National Council decided to hold a Special General Meeting on the morning of Saturday 2nd October. There had been no AGM in Cardiff 2020, with the Zoom AGM in April 2021 deciding the resolutions that had been held over from 2020. To avoid a big backlog at the Cardiff AGM in 2022, we decided that we would hold a Special General Meeting at the Big Weekend to get through some of the business.

After welcoming all to the meeting, President Peter Good asked the National Secretary Bernard Elwen to deal with the formalities of the meeting. Purposes and Objects were read by Bosco Townsend of Beeston 41 Club. He then welcomed the Past Presidents and asked the President of 41 Club International, Luca Colombo, to say a few words.

Three Association Awards were presented to those who had given exceptional service to our Association, these being:

Sean McCormick - citation read by Jim Conway

Tom Atkins – citation read by Wynn Parry

Nick Morcumb – citation read by Glen Lyon

Several past members of National Council were presented with their jewels, as follows:

Sean McCormick – National Secretary; Tom Atkins – National Councillors' Liaison Officer; Kevin Stewart – Region 2; Kevin Lovett – Region 7; Ralph Small – Region 12; Andy Ventress – Region 15; Kelly Clarke – Region 17; Mark House – Region 18; Bernard Elwen – Region 19; Glen Lyon – Region 21; Mark Hinchliffe – Region 22; and, Peter McBride – Region 24.

There were six resolutions on the order paper, the first four of which were brought by National Council and the last two submitted by London Old Tablers' Society, seconded by Wimbledon Womblers 41 Club and were recommended by National Council. These were as follows:

**Resolution 1** – Amend the rules to allow for the National Councillors' Liaison Officer to be selected by the National Councillors as their representative as opposed to being elected by the membership. **This was carried.** 

**Resolution 2** – Clarification of the rules around honorary membership. **This was carried.** 

**Resolution 3** – Amendment and clarification of the rules around where National Councillors could live in order to be eligible to represent their region. This was carried.

**Resolution 4** – Approval to investigate charitable status for the Association. This was carried, after one amendment.

**Resolution 5** – Amendment of the rules to allow those over 85 to receive free membership, in the same way as those between 40 and 45. There was an amendment received to widen the scope to those members who were infirm. The amendment was defeated. The original resolution was then voted upon. **After a recount it narrowly failed to secure the requisite margin of 66% +1 so was defeated.** 

**Resolution 6** – to allow the surviving partners of deceased members to continue to receive 41 Club benefits as if their partner were still alive. **This required a simple majority and was carried.** 

The National President then allowed members of the National Board to make short presentations and updates:-Jim Conway – Vice President. Looking forward to getting out and about and visiting as many clubs as he could over the next two years. Anyone who wanted to book him for an event should speak to his diary convenor, Roger Spensley.

**Bernard Elwen - National Secretary.** The Admin Committee are looking at online participation at future General Meetings and investigating ways of allowing voting.

**<u>Kevin Lovett - National Treasurer.</u>** Capitation coming in well from clubs as they are now meeting. Thanks to Club Treasurers. CAS2 will automatically update the 2022 capitation amount and prepare an invoice to be downloaded.

<u>Don Mullane – National Comms and IT Officer.</u> Clubs would be getting an e-mail about the next 41 Club Connects, which would be North York Moors Railway and Piglet. He apologised for the non-appearance of the latest 41 Club magazine.

<u>Andy Ventress – IRO.</u> Had done most of international travel via Zoom rather than Lufthansa and Easyjet. Thanked clubs for their responses to the international participation survey. He also mentioned a microsite being developed. He was booked to visit Belgium and Verona and hoped to go to Malta.

<u>Steve James – National Fellowship Officer.</u> Fellowship events are now in full swing. The Car Rally had taken place in Kent in July, followed few weeks later by the Camping and Caravanning Rally The walking weekend in Pembrokeshire had been very successful, even though a few people had found the route more challenging than they expected. Several events next year had been planned. The Car Rally would be hosted by Market Harborough 41 Club in July. National Sports and Social Weekend would be in Okehampton in early February. The motorcycling weekend would be happening in July. The 41 Club Cruise would be going to Iceland in September. Arrangements for Cardiff 2022 were all going to plan. There would be information on three new member benefits in the forthcoming magazine.

<u>Glen Lyon - National Membership Officer.</u> His committee are looking at setting up a tripartite agreement with rotary and the Masons to try to capture those ex-Tablers who had joined these organisations and not 41 Club.

<u>Peter McBride – National Councillors' Liaison Officer.</u> Pleased with the enthusiasm from National Councillors and pleased to represent them on the Board. He also mentioned the 41 Club Buddies and Buddyline initiative, as well as the Whisky Appreciation Group.

<u>Andrew Mackereth - Immediate Past President.</u> Made a surprise presentation to Dave Campbell, Past President, on behalf of Haverhill 41 Club. It was explained by a member from Haverhill that this was a penis protector - whether it is big enough for Dave Campbell is something that only he can answer.

Peter Walker (National Councillor for Region 9) presented the National President with a cheque for Dementia UK from the cycling challenge. The National President thanked him and replied that his charity was now up to £30k.

The National President thanked all those who had put the meeting together and all those who had made the Big Weekend such a success.

The next meeting will be the AGM on Saturday 2nd April 2022 in Cardiff.

Saturday 2nd October at The Big Weekend saw the official end of the On Yer Bike challenge with me having the greatest of pleasure in presenting President Peter Good with a cheque for £5686.10 (the amount has since risen to £5912 as donations were received after the cheque was written).

You will recall that the challenge was to 'virtually' cycle from Aviemore to Nottingham, which was planned by the most direct route (which as we all will see on a map is via Cardiff!!). On day 1, I prepared by watching the first stage of the Giro d'Italia on TV. It may have been a relatively short time trial at 8.6 km but to see Filippo Ganna complete it in less than 9 minutes at an average speed of 36.5 mph was just staggering. Hardly something I aspire to and I can always use the excuse that he has a 38 year age advantage over me!

Not to be disheartened, we all set off. Participants logged their local mileage on a weekly basis and it was plotted on a master map to show where they were along the 706 mile route. We encountered several difficulties on the way, with technology letting us down in that people weren't getting updates, but the main one was that several people incurred injuries, which shouldn't be of any great surprise – we are 41ers after all!

Fellow National Councillor (Region 15) Neal Lowe joined us cyclists but took part on foot as training for the London Marathon. Just for Neal, we called his challenge In Yer Trainers.

Despite some challenging weather conditions at times when we looked more like we had been swimming than cycling, a great time was had by all and Steve 'Lordy' Lord was so enthused, he decided that when he had finished the first 706 miles, he would do it again in reverse. Not only that, he raised a fantastic sum of money towards our total, then joined a cycling club and started entering races. Some people just can't get enough of a good thing. We had another rider, Simon Clough, tackling the steepest A road in Britain - OK, he did it going downhill but that is more scary and more of a mental challenge than the uphill journey - when your brakes are getting red hot and the chances of crashing are hugely magnified (even the professional riders crash going down mountains). If you want to check it out, take a road bike with skinny wheels and run it across damp ground, then check how much of the tyre is wet – that is what is in contact with the road - it's not much!

This challenge followed on from the 500 mile and 500 more walking challenge with both being in aid of Dementia UK. If you've not been affected by having a loved one battling against it, take it from me, it's not pleasant. You find yourself losing someone a little bit at a time and robs you of the person and personality you knew and loved. 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
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# Greetings from "Little England beyond Wales" 41 CLUB WALKING WEEKEND 24 - 26 SEPTEMBER 2021

During the weekend of 24-26 Sep, 43 intrepid 41 Club and Tangent members descended on the tiny village of Lamphey in South Pembrokeshire to attend the inaugural 41 club walking weekend. Pembrokeshire was chosen because of its beautiful scenery and the fact that I am a native of the county I wanted to showcase what the area had to offer.

Several people decided to make it a longer break so a Thursday evening stroll around Tenby was arranged and after watching the sunset we went for a meal in a local hostelry. On Friday morning we drove to St David's the UK's smallest city and after visiting the cathedral we did a short walk across the coast path from Caerfai bay to Porthclais returning to St Davids. Whilst the group decided to have refreshments in a local pub, I had to get back to Lamphey to meet the walkers who were arriving for the main weekend.

A number of people had already arrived early that afternoon to explore the area and as is usual in 41 club events a number were already sitting in the sunshine having a drink outside the hotel greeting old and making new friends. The main hotel for the weekend was the Lamphey Hall hotel with a number of guests also staying in the Lamphey court hotel (me included) and walking up each evening for dinner. The conversation and fellowship at the evening meal was second to none and the chef had prepared excellent meals for everyone.

Saturday was the main day for walking and I had carefully chosen 3 routes along the coastal path of varying distances (4, 8 and 12 miles) where walkers could decide to stop and return to the hotel via bus. Everyone was up early in order to catch one of the few trains – 7 to be exact that run to Tenby on a Saturday. As readers can gather Pembrokeshire is not commuter belt country and on the line the train has to slow down at every crossing because there are no barriers or signals to warn cars of an oncoming train.

As we arrived in Tenby we headed to the South Beach for the obligatory group photo before everyone departed across the mile of sand up on to the headland. Each walker was given a comprehensive illustrated instruction leaflet which I have to thank Karen, my wife and Andy Ventress, our IRO for acting as glamorous assistants by pointing out the directions to take as highlighted in the guide photo's.

**Stage 1 to Lydstep was a 4 mile walk**, the first mile across the South beach before ascending on the headland for a relatively flat walk with stunning views across to Caldey island and some fascinating rock structures. Halfway along the coast path we came across remnants of First World War trenches that were built to teach troops how to build trenches and more importantly how to survive in them. On arriving at Lydstep those that had opted to walk 4 miles either took the bus back to Tenby to spend the afternoon in the town whilst others returned to the hotel.

**Stage 2 Lydstep to Manorbier** took the walkers up from the caravan park to the headland where we were confronted by a steep decent down a valley via 126 steps before proceeding up the headland via a meandering path on the other side. The path took us past Skrinkle Haven then we had to walk around the MOD firing range at Manorbier before heading back on to the coast path for the last 2 miles. As the path winds around the coastline, it's an exhilarating walk with outstanding views of the secluded but wide expanse of Presipe Beach and the backdrop of huge, steep and dramatically ridged cliffs.

As we approached Manorbier we were greeted by the magnificent sight of Manorbier castle which was founded in the late 11th century by the Anglo-Norman de Barry family. At Manorbier, walkers enjoyed lunch either in the tearooms or local pub. Throughout this stage myself and Andy Ventress remained back markers to assist those who were slower in pace so by the time we arrived at Manorbier the others were ready to leave either to catch the bus back to the hotel or the hardy group wanting to navigate the most rugged and picturesque part of the walk. The group started together but after the first mile and several ascents/descents we were soon strung out. The views across the bays were stunning and halfway along the stage we came across the secluded Swanlake bay which can only be reached by foot. There were a few people swimming in the sea and I soon felt like jumping in to cool off but realised that I would have to walk the remaining 2 miles sodden which would not have been pleasant and the option to skinny dip would not have been a pleasant sight so the hotel pool it was.

There were some tired legs and several blisters at the conclusion of the walk but some of us decided to walk the further 1.5 miles back to the hotel.

Saturday's dinner and several pints were a real welcome and it was great to listen to the tales of the walkers.

On Sunday we drove to Bosherston which is famous for its extensive Lilly Ponds, although they were not in bloom they were quite an impressive spectacle. The walking options were either a short 1.5 mile around the lily ponds or a 5 mile walk through the lily ponds, across Broadhaven south beach, up the headland and to St Govans chapel. Karen acted as backmarker for the day which meant I was able to lead the group. Everyone enjoyed the lily ponds and walking on the soft sand and up over to the headland caused the group to string out, until we regrouped for a rest in the beach car park situated on top of the cliffs.

The walk was relatively flat with a marvellous views of the sea, however everyone was warned that we would be walking on part of the Castlemartin tank firing range and that they should stay within the white markers to avoid stepping on an unexploded shell. That sobered a few people up especially as some people commented that they had heard the thud of the shells when they were doing night manouveres on Friday night.

The final stop of the walk was St Govans chapel which is built in the side of the cliffs. Legend has it that the number of steps going down are different to the number of steps when you walk back up but sadly no one decided to test that out. We walked back to the village tea rooms for refreshments and we said our goodbyes. I would like to thank everyone for supporting me by attending this event and from reading Northampton nene 341 Club fatter magazine it was great to see the comments of Ken Banfield who wrote about the weekend by saying "So there you have it another brilliant event to add to every 41er or Tangent member's calendar and or bucket list, the National Walking Weekend just must be done even if you don't do any walking"

Plans are already in place for the next 2 years walking weekends and further details will follow in due course.

# An Update on The 41 Club Garden at the National Memorial Arboretum

The National Memorial Arboretum is situated on 150 acres of land near Lichfield in Staffordshire, within The National Forest. The area is slowly developing to become a majestic world of trees and a living memorial – a place of peace, reflection and enjoyment of nature. It is being planted with species native to Britain as well as exotic varieties from every continent. Its inspiration came from the late Group Captain Lord Cheshire V.C. who felt that something should be done to forever remember our debt to those who gave their lives to defend our freedom. In addition, the National Memorial Arboretum (NMA) is there to remember the significant contribution of any individual or organisation during our time. Several years ago the management of The Arboretum was taken over by the British Legion although it continues to be run as a separate body.

The Arboretum was officially opened in 2001 by the Dutchess of Kent and now hosts an impressive Visitor Centre, Function Suite, Restaurant and Chapel. Members of the Royal Family and high-ranking military personnel, current and retired, regularly attend functions and dedications. Visitor numbers are now in excess of 300,000 per annum. Recently The Arboretum, together with the National Forest Company announced plans to create a 25-acre woodland on adjacent land as a living memorial in memory of all the lives lost due to the pandemic. A 980-year lease has been granted by quarry operator Tarmac.

Now I would like to give you an insight into how the 41 Club Garden at the NMA came almost 20 years ago. During my last few months as National President, Lichfield 41 Club made an approach requesting The Association's support for their appeal for funds to help create a 41Club Garden of Remembrance at the NMA. The National Council of the day was glad to add their support and a letter was sent by Lichfield 41 to all Clubs in the Association appealing for contributions. As a result, nearly £5,000 was raised, with donations from over 200 Clubs throughout Great Britain and Ireland and some from overseas.

In September 2001, a plot was reserved, and plans were made for an Auction of Promises to be held at the Arboretum in June 2002 when a further £6,000 was raised on the night followed by a contribution of £1500 from RTBI. In the years that followed Lichfield 41 Club undertook the maintenance of the Garden but as the Arboretum grew in stature and following the operation being taken over by the British Legion this became more difficult and nowadays only authorised contractors are permitted on site. Approximately 10 years ago the Garden was refurbished, and the Tangent Sundial added and a few years after that the cost of ongoing maintenance was taken over by The Association with our National President Peter involved over the past few years.

I am sorry to say that this summer the garden looked very run down and neglected. This cannot be acceptable so we, Lichfield 41, have been in discussion with the NMA in an attempt to resolve the issue. Remedial work is well underway with the cost of £1,768 INC VAT agreed with National. We now must consider the cost of ongoing maintenance on an annual basis or the purchase of an annuity in perpetuity. It is interesting to note that all new memorial gardens require an endowment in place as a condition of purchase. Presently maintenance at the 41 Club Garden is by crisis with emphasis on Remembrance Sunday and no

consideration given to the state of the Garden throughout the rest of the year.

The Arboretum have quoted a figure of £1,276 plus VAT (£1531) for annual maintenance, or £27,375 for an endowment which will provide funds for perpetual maintenance, but before they "accept" such an agreement they would require to make good the paving around the Tangent Sun Dial at a cost of £576 + VAT (£691)and possibly a further sum to make good other areas, such as the signage, rondels and possibly the edging to the circular path surrounding the garden following which ongoing remedial work can be accommodated withing the perpetual agreement. Any agreement would be for maintenance and not replacement of trees or memorials.

An ongoing contract will include the following:-

- Hand wash / steam clean where necessary, of memorial stone and integrated objects (minimum twice per annum)
- Thermatec ® PAVED area (minimum twice per annum)
- Chemical: herbicide, pesticide or fungicide application (minimum twice per annum)
- Hand mowing and collect around memorial footprint and other integrated objects during growing season
- Machine mowing during growing season
- Trim Conifers (minimum three times per annum)
- Re-wax bronze (annually)
- Thermatec ® and oil application of 5 wooden benches (annually)

I believe that the Association must commit to one or other of the options on the table from the NMA.

We at Lichfield 41 Club have asked National Council to give serious consideration to following the endowment option. The annual plan, even if costs remain constant, which will not be the case, will exceed the cost of purchasing the endowment within 18 years. I know that an outflow of more than £27,000 would be quite a hit on our reserve but what I remember about our balance sheet at the end of 2020 I believe we are in a healthy position. In the past!! About 25 years ago when I had the privilege of being your National Treasurer, The Association was taken to task at an AGM as our reserves where considered excessive and that resulted in £45.000 being donated to Charity in various forms over a couple of years.

I believe that the purchase of an endowment is the route to follow and don't forget that this is a Round Table Family Garden so I suggest that Tangent, RTBI and Circle are approached for a contribution. There could be another alternative. Lichfield 41, or at least some of the members of Lichfield 41, are happy to join with a representation from National Council to lead another National Appeal for Funds. The sum required is a tall ask for an appeal so I suggest that a percentage of the sum required, say 50%, could be underwritten by The Association and other Family members to ensure that the Garden is maintained in perpetuity for generations to come.

The National Memorial Arboretum continues to grow in prominence, and it is pleasing that The Association has been involved since the beginning. We ask that our National Council support what is proposed to ensure that the 41 Club Garden continues to be a place to be proud of going forward into the future.





Training started in January this year and has included challenging treks in Snowdonia, the Peak District, the lake District and Brecon Beacons.

Nepal is currently under lockdown as a new wave of the delta variant continues to surge. Not disheartened the team are now aiming to trek to the summit of the Everest of the UK, Ben Nevis, on the 16th October 2021 to mark the original date they would have left the U.K for Nepal so everyone is looking forward to that.

A number of events are being planned to support the 41 club Presidents charity Dementia U.K. and The Frank Bruno Mental health Foundation so look out for further details in the year ahead.

Each member of the team have their own fund raising pages and will be asking for support. 
