Like many of our members, we are deeply concerned by the Russian invasion of the Ukraine which is leading to a growing humanitarian crisis. Our preferred way of donating is via the Round Table Family route set out below because we believe it benefits from negligible overheads AND the aid will, we believe, get to where it is needed quicker:-

The actual situation in the Ukraine is for all of us incomprehensible – we are shocked. Whilst there is no 41 Club in the Ukraine, and only a nascent Round Table; Old Tablers' Germany ("OTD") together with Round Table Germany ("RTD"), Ladies Circle Germany and Agora Club Tangent Germany) has organised an annual Christmas Parcels and Help Aid Convoy to the Ukraine. Over the years we have built a great network of friends who will coordinate locally all efforts of these convoys. OTD has initiated an appeal immediately, using the infrastructure of the 2 convoy organisations which act under the "Foundation Round Table Germany".

OTD write: There is an immense need for monetary donations and medical large equipment we would like to inform 41ers what is needed and about the way, how you can support.

Here a few more facts for you to understand:

Important: we are not going to a war zone! We deliver to the border regions in Poland and Moldova, where our friends from the Ukraine will pick the donations up. Donations in kind in smaller units are enormously difficult at the moment, because the Ukrainians have communicated to us relatively clearly what is needed. At a later stage, this will certainly become even more relevant.

We "only" get as far as the border. The storage capacities at these places are limited and the risk of picking up and the effort for it, is gigantic for the Ukrainians. That is why we ask for monetary donations. Only with this we can deliver exactly what is urgently needed, especially during the first important trips. Monetary donations can go straight to the account of our foundation or directly to: paypal@rtd-stiftung.de reference/usage: "Convoy"; transferring through "family and friends" to avoid additional cost of PayPal.

We show our solidarity. We show that we have not forgotten Ukraine. We show our support.

Our Ukrainian partners would like us to accept donations from abroad and use them in this project.

What stronger proof of trust can there be towards us? Let us build on it.

A message from...

Peter Good - National President





Two years ago I took over as your National President and unfortunately we went straight into COVID Lockdown.

I am not a person to just sit back and do nothing, so I was on the phone daily to my PLC Chairman, Marcus Jones, and one morning I said "I have to have some way of connecting with membership or the Association will die." Marcus said "That's it -Connects", we got Mark House, our IT expert, to set it up; and Marcus used his contacts from work to get the speakers. Originally during the first lockdown the speakers were free of charge, as they were people returning favours to Marcus and were only too happy to help.

This worked brilliantly with some big named celebrities and sporting personalities. The numbers of members participating increased which made Connects very successful.

The second Lockdown came again quickly, and by then speakers wanted to charge. This was understandable as they were unable to work, in the same way that I couldn't visit clubs, so I said to pay for them from my expenses allowance. We continued to have an excellent line up of speakers and the attendance was great with over a thousand at some events. This was achieving my aim of keeping the members of the Association in touch with each other, which was great.

On the back of Connects we had other things starting up and I thought we should be looking to help any members with problems during Lockdown, so we set up the Buddies Line. Peter McBride took this on board and did a lot of research setting up the buddies on a phone line manned 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year. Peter also started

the wellbeing group. Thank you for your help in this Peter.

We have lots of special interest groups for example Wine Tasting, whiskey enthusiasts etc., the cookery nights with the ladies getting involved, a walking group, and others. Clubs also launched virtual activities like the Murder Mystery evenings on Zoom hosted by Market Harborough – and there were others too.

Also, on Facebook there are various hobby groups, so there are many interesting things happening in the Association to bring us together more, and I hope these will continue in the future.

During the lockdown we had the Zoom meetings where I probably met more members than in normal times . I would be on Zoom every night seven days a week when possible and sometimes with three clubs in one night.

All of these things didn't happen in the Association before the pandemic, so the digital world not only saved us but helped us move forward. They are available to all members, and the Connects meetings were normally recorded for members to use for meetings.

Lesley and I managed to attend the caravan rally organised by Martin Green. This was a very good event and enabled us to meet with old friends and make new ones. We were made to feel very welcome which was much appreciated.

We had the Big Weekend in Nottingham in July 2021 during a break in restrictions. This


was to celebrate 41 Club being 75 years old and should have taken place the year before. A lot more things were planned that unfortunately had to be cancelled. We all had a great weekend with lots of fun and fellowship. My thanks go to my PLC chaired by Marcus Jones, and everyone who helped, putting this event together.

Then a few more months of cancellations followed. Thankfully I did have the honour to represent 41 Club at the Cenotaph. This was a very humbling experience which I will never forget. My thanks go to Don Mullane and Dominic Price for getting us accommodation at the Reform Club which just made the weekend even more special.

There were a few Christmas events but most were cancelled, then it was the Burns nights. I attended Christchurch that had three other clubs attending, a great night of fellowship and fun and the best haggis I have ever had. Then I attended a local club, Swadlincote, with my driver for the night being Scottish having to address the haggis for them.

January over, things start to get going with Brentwood Ladies Night followed by a drive through the night to Devon for NSSW in Okehampton. Definitely getting too old for this kind of thing. I was shattered! But, after a few hours sleep I was ready to go. Having not booked in for any sports I planned on just walking round supporting everybody, but actually ended up taking part in 5 events. Had my name been Barry I would have won!!

This was a great weekend. It was buzzing with loads of fun and fellowship Looking forward to Scotland where the next NSSW is taking place.



From February to the end of my term at the end of March, I am trying to cram two years visiting into two months, going up and down the country to visit clubs and chartering new Clubs. There are up to 24 new clubs now and still more to do, 4 clubs reaffiliated and 3 Phoenix clubs started up. The future of 41 club is now looking good for the on coming years. This is not just doing worthwhile things, it's raising the profile of the Round Table Family because when people ask who we are, they don't know what 41 Club is about, but when we explain that we are ex-Round Table, it raises Table's profile also.

My thanks go out to all my Board members and Councillors for working so hard

RNLI Presentation for the National Presidents Joint Appeal for 2019-2020


Due to Covid restrictions 41 Club National Past President Andrew Mackereth and Tangent National Past President Sue Hill finally managed to visit Poole the RNLI headquarters. This was to present the cheque to the RNLI, an amazing amount of money raised from their joint charity during their year in office. The presentation was made to Jayne George head of Marketing and Media.

The members of both organisations were very generous as £55,173 was collected. The money has purchased 6 water rescue craft to work from beaches throughout the UK. The first 2 rescue craft will be stationed at Crantock and Fistral Beaches in Newquay to work with the RNLI Lifeguards. They have all been named Continued Friendship 1 to 6 and have the 41 Club and Tangent logos on them. The RNLI have promised to send us more details about where the other watercraft will be positioned.

Andrew and Sue had a tour of the College, taking in the workshops followed by the training pool. The bravery and strength of the volunteers who man these lifeboats, risking their own lives on many occasions was very evident.



Andrew and his wife Millie are now volunteering for the RNLI and are helping at their Morecambe seafront shop.



I owe the Round Table Family much since joining 35 years ago and like you, it has given me lifelong friendships and personal support - and I'd like to give something back.

It was this feeling that encouraged me to establish the National Buddyline in 2020 to support our members.

RESOLUTION 1: An Endowment to be purchased at a cost of £28,427.92 to provide maintenance in perpetuity for the 41 Club Garden located at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire. Prior to the endowment being accepted by the National Memorial Arboretum some minor works require to be undertaken at a cost of around £1,500. The total cost to be charged against Cash Reserves in the current year (2022) will be within £30,000. This is proposed by Lichfield 41 Club and seconded by Ashby-de-la Zouch 41 Club

RESOLUTION 2: 41 Club members may invite like-minded men who are not past members of Round Table and are aged 45 and over to be regular guests at club meetings. After a period deemed suitable by each Club, such guests may be invited to join that Club and such invitations may later be ratified by a majority vote of full members of said club. Such new members would enjoy full membership rights in the local club and also in the National Association.

Should this change be adopted it is noted that:

- Association Rule 2.1 will require a change to the definition of "Full Members" to include "Invited Members who are not past members of Round Table and are aged 45 or over"
- Rule 4.1 and "Model rules for an affiliated Club (April 2010)" will require supporting amends.
- Acknowledging 41 Club International rules, Members who have not been Round Tablers may not stand for the position of International Relationships Officer, nor vote for the Association at any meeting of 41 Club International

This is proposed by Wokingham 41 Club and Seconded by Reading Valley Veterans 41 Club (both Region 20).

RESOLUTION 3: Amend Rules 6.5 and 18.4, replacing the date of 1st February with 10th January in each case.

Rationale: This change of submission dates will allow National Board and National Council more opportunity to consider resolutions submitted by clubs and reach a decision as to whether they are supported,

prior to the Order Paper being circulated to clubs within the set timescales. It will also allow more time for publication of candidates' election manifestos in the 41 Club magazine

RESOLUTION 4: National Council seeks the approval of the 41 Club membership to register as an unincorporated charitable association.

Rationale: Our association was set up primarily as a fellowship organisation, to provide a means for former members of Round Table to continue their friendships after Round Table, in accordance with Purposes and Objects. 41 Club is increasingly being involved in fundraising and community activities, and National Council considers that there is benefit from our Association being formally recognised by the Charity Commission.

RESOLUTION 5: National Council propose that all income received from our Members' affinity deals such as Fred Olsen etc should be put in a separate budget line to be used to support local or National fellowship events.

Rationale: Organisers of events such as charters, dinners, National events etc can apply to receive a grant of up to £200 which can be used for matters relating to entertainment for the event e.g., speaker, band, DJ etc.

All applications should be sent to the National Fellowship Officer who will determine the merits or otherwise of awarding a grant and the amount given based on the income available in the affinity budget.

RESOLUTION 6: That the Association has a Mascot to represent them at major events.

This is proposed by Clevedon & District 41 Club (Region 21) and seconded by Isis Area 41 Club (Region 20).

Rationale: We believe that a prestigious and inclusive organisation such as 41 Club should enhance its profile by the provision of an Association Mascot. This mascot should be present at all major events staged by the Association, and it should be within the remit of the retiring Immediate Past National President to ensure the health, safety and welfare of

such an important feature be maintained. Full details of the proposed mascot and how this will operate will be detailed to the membership at the AGM.

RESOLUTION 7: Amend Rule 20.9 to remove the phrase "without exceeding an increase of 4% (£0.50) to each Member per annum"

Rationale: In these uncertain times to allow the National Treasurer to adjust Capitation in-line with the recommendations of the Finance Committee and with National Council approval to maintain the Reserve's Policy of the Association and to keep within each Annual Budget.

RESOLUTION 8: Amend Rule 9.3.1 to include: Any former National Councillor may seek re-election for a further term of three years, after a minimum of three years has elapsed since the end of the previous term as Councillor.

Rationale: National Council propose to add this rule, so that any member of 41 Club can seek election as a National Councillor after there has been a break of at least three years on National Council. This will enable the Association to draw upon those with experience on National Council, whilst still giving the opportunity for members to seek election for the first time.

RESOLUTION 9: National Council seeks the approval of the membership to allow online voting and participation at Annual General Meetings, in parallel with physical attendance. Amend all Rules and Standing Orders where necessary to allow for this to happen. This to take effect from Annual General Meeting in 2023.

Rationale: The coronavirus pandemic has demonstrated that many clubs and club members are far more comfortable with taking part in online meetings and events than they were previously. The 2021 Annual General Meeting was conducted entirely online, as an emergency measure due to the pandemic, and there have been several requests for online voting and participation to continue on a permanent basis. If this resolution is approved, the online participation and voting instructions would be issued 35 days in advance of the meeting, to accompany the Order Paper.

National AGMs

Towards the end of 2021 with the easing of travel regulations I was able to attend the National AGMs of both Belgium and Malta. Travel to both countries was relatively easy after we had got to grip with the testing needed and the forms that needed to be submitted when travelling in both directions. It was of course great to be able to join in the fellowship, Welcome Parties, lunches and Gala Dinners, offered by both countries and attend their AGMs and take the greetings and best wishes from GB&I to the boards of both associations. It is very interesting to listen to different AGM debates and realise that all associations are discussing the same issues, even in Malta that is an association of one club.







This year the Race, watched by thousands of spectators, raised £3,000 for two local Hospices and over the years Table and 41 Club have been instrumental in raising hundreds of thousands of pounds for local charities, excluding other fund raising activities, by organising this very Race alone.

Three races (Junior, Open and Ladies) are held and this year the Ladies Race broke a new record. It was won by local ladies Abi Leiper and Caitlin Flanagan covering the one mile course in just 7 minutes and 36 seconds.

41 Club broke its own record too this year! Marshalling, yet again, was 94 years young 41 Club Member, Neil Buchanan. Neil joined South Shields Round Table (No. 162) in 1954 and has now been a member of our 'Table Family' for 67 years! At the age of 40 he became a member of 41 Club and has been a member of our great 41 Club organisation for 54 years!

Retired Chartered Civil Engineer Neil has been an avid attendee of numerous national conferences and also an international conference in Durban over



his years as a member of the Association. Of his (safety) marshalling duties Neil says 'I seem to have been doing it for as long as I can remember!'

Accommodation can be arranged for those who wish to stay an extra night on the Thursday or Sunday.



On Saturday 5th March, The RTBI National Board and Council agreed to donate £20,000 to Round Table Deutschland's humanitarian efforts in Ukraine.



It was further agreed that they would look to set a target of raising £95,000 in their 95th Anniversary month, demonstrating that they are #rootedincommunity.

Immediately accepting that challenge was Ash Gardner from Beeston & District Round Table 573 and his wife, Emily Gardner, a member of Long Eaton Ladies Circle. They

decided to walk from Marchesi House in Birmingham to the Embassy of the Ukraine in London between Thursday 10th March and Sunday 13th March - >120 miles in 4 days. Two great people doing something amazing to help those most at need.

Who are Ash and Emily?



Just normal Tablers and Circlers like you once were! Ash is the Vice Chairman of Beeston 573 and on the RTBI National Council as the representative of Region 8. Emily is a member of Long Easton Ladies Circle 611. They had been watching the humanitarian crisis unfold in the Ukraine in recent weeks and have been desperate to help. They were inspired by the work that Round Table Deutschland has been doing in coordinating the funds already raised (now over €2million) into relief convoys.

What was their route?

- Day 1 Marchesi House to Wellesbourne.
- Day 2 Wellesbourne to Weston on the Green
- Day 3
 Weston on the Green to Wendover
- Day 4
 Wendover to the Ukrainian Embassy.

Jim Conway supported the couple and met up with them at the start and during the walk. Jim said: 'You can't help but admire their mental fortitude. They are fatigued, injured and have feet full of blisters, yet despite that, the smiles and strength of character has been incredible...if walking 120 miles to raise money for the Ukrainian relief fund wasn't amazing enough, it is pouring with rain and their blisters have blisters!"



Calamity hit on the morning of Day 4, the Final Day, when Ash's knee gave up on him, but Emily carried on, with Ash in the support car. This showed the enormity and difficulty of the challenge they had undertaken - simply magnificent and why they needed our support and donations more than ever.



Did they make it?

What do you think!

Emily said: "We made it. So much emotion and so much pride to carry the Ukrainian flag 121 miles. What a wonderful welcome from the strongest and most admiral people. Your support has been incredible, what a team effort this has been. We will reflect properly over the next few days, but the overwhelming feeling is pride in our Round Table family and what we can achieve when we work together. When Ukraine are victorious, we will be there to help them rebuild."

Asdh and Emily are two amazing people who undertook a monumental challenge on behalf of others. It was a demonstration of how pain, emotional lows and fatigue can be overcome by mental fortitude, as they captured the spirit of what the Round Table Family stands for...

If you can afford to, consider making a donation from your club or personally, every amount, no matter how big or small will make a difference towards the appeal.

So What is 41 Club Doing for the Ukraine?

As well as supporting Ash & Emily in their fundraising, 41 Club has promoted the RT Deutschland/Old Tablers Deutschland appeal to all members. We haven't run a separate fund because the urgency of the crisis demanded that monies be sent immediately rather than collated and sent. Ash & Emily aren't the only members of the Round Table Family doing amazing feats - Mark Hinchliffe, National Councillor Region 22 - West of England, has been co-ordinating shipments of aid materiel from 41 Clubs, Round Tables, Rotary Clubs, Masons and other in the West of England; Mark Boersma in Thirsk 41 Club has done similar, with two 40-foot articulated lorries (about 25 tons) sent already, and more locally furnishing homes for arriving refugees. We have asked clubs

and individual members to inform Andy Ventress international@41club.org in confidence how much they have donated so that we can keep track of the totals. So far 31 lorry loads of relief aid have reached the borders of the Ukraine from the RTD/OTD Appeal. At a national level we have supported Mark Hinchliffe and Ash & Emily with the maximum allowed (£1,000 each £2,000 in total) – and an emergency resolution to donate a greater figure will be floored at the Cardiff AGM.


